

# Information Technology

In thinking about writing this technical article I've reflected on some of the challenges we face on a regular basis, well the challenges I have had. One that seems to make a regular reoccurrence is information. It could be quantity too little or even too much. Other challenges could be the quality of information and how to make sense of it.

With these questions in mind many of us have looked to vendors that provide either computer based or mobile application-based programs to assist us. Several people I know use multiple programs with the desire to get "relevant" information which provides "actionable" data. For me there two biggest challenges are "relevant" and "actionable." With more and more companies out there how do we know which ones will help?

Here are some steps that I think are helpful:

- 1. Identify the problem you are trying to solve.
- Have some solutions in mind.
- Talk to trusted advisors about your concerns. This is actually where I find great value in the ASSP. We have so many members in our chapter that are very knowledgeable, skilled willing to listen and share from their experience.
- 4. Get with vendors you have researched.

- a. Share your problem and thoughts on the solutions
- b. Get their feedback
- c. Listen to their pitch
- d. Review solutions
- e. Ask for references
- f.• Review references
- 5. When looking at software, it is important to understand the cost and return on investment (ROI).

Technology is getting better and better, there are even great strides being made with Artificial Intelligence. Many people in the chapter know that I have been working with some of these groups for the last couple years. I have worked with the good, the great and not so great. I am excited to see the progress that's being made.
